
Events nationwide this year are marking 400 years since enslaved Africans were first landed in North America. Locally, the Massachusetts Council of Churches is coordinating "May We Forever Stand," an ecumenical worship service at which people of faith will gather to honor ancestors, commemorate 400 years of black resiliency and pray for an end to systemic racial injustice. All are welcome. The service takes place on Friday, Sept. 20, 7:30 p.m., at the Greater Framingham Community Church (44 Franklin Street) in Framingham. An afternoon preaching class, "Preaching Black Resiliency," with the Rev. Dr. Leslie Callahan of St. Paul's Baptist Church in Philadelphia, will be offered earlier that day, at noon, at People's Baptist Church (134 Camden Street) in Boston.

The Cathedral Church of St. Paul (138 Tremont Street) invites everyone to the opening night of the exhibition "ABRAHAM: Out of One, Many" on Sunday, Oct. 27 at 4 p.m. Three Middle Eastern contemporary visual artists from the faith traditions of Islam, Christianity and Judaism have each created five paintings that interpret Abraham's life and faith journey for us today, serving as a guide toward creating cultures of peace, harmony, justice and healing—all as descendants of a shared heritage. The cathedral church will host docent-led tours and other events related to the topic of Abraham and his descendents throughout the exhibition, which will be open through Dec. 6. Joy of Living Senior Lunches



Search Committee Calls New Rector Christina Latour

The Search Committee voted on a candidate to present to the Vestry for consideration on Tuesday, 9/10. It is with great pleasure that we announce the Diocese has approved the Vestry's decision to call Rev. Paul Tarrant to serve as our next 3/4-time Priest-in-Charge (PIC) at the Episcopal Church of St. Thomas, Taunton.

Some parishioners may remember Fr. Paul from his previous term as Rector in 1990-1996. Since that time, Fr. Paul moved back to the United Kingdom and has been serving in his clergy role independently. Meanwhile, our congregation has changed significantly. As such, he has agreed to return to St. Thomas as a Priest-in-Charge — enabling him to serve a three-year term at the Parish to determine whether we are still a good match. After that discernment, the Parish can elect to invite Fr. Paul to be our tenured Rector. Likewise, Fr. Paul has a choice as to whether he wants to continue to serve us.

As Fr. Paul will be relocating from the United Kingdom, there are many formalities that must be addressed, so a start date has not yet been determined. We look forward to welcoming him back to St. Thomas as soon as possible.

From a novel, "On the Road with the Archangel:" based on the book of Tobit.

I am Raphael, one of the seven archangels who pass in and out of the presence of the Holy One, blessed be he. I bring him the prayers of all who pray and those who don't even know that they're praying.

Some prayers I hold out as far from me as my arm will reach, the way a woman holds a dead mouse by the tail when she removes it from the kitchen. Some, like flowers, are almost too beautiful to touch, and others so aflame that I'd be afraid of their setting me on fire if I weren't already more like fire than I am like anything else. There are prayers of such power that you might almost say they carry me rather than the other way round—the way a bird with outstretched wings is carried higher and higher on the back of the wind. There are prayers so apologetic and shamefaced and halfhearted that they all but melt away in my grasp like sad little flakes of snow. Some prayers are very boring.

War broke out in heaven; Michael and his angels fought against the dragon. The dragon and his angels fought back, but they were defeated, and there was no longer any place for them in heaven. The great dragon was thrown down, that ancient serpent, who is called the Devil and Satan, the deceiver of the whole world—he was thrown down to the earth, and his angels were thrown down with him.

Revelation 12:7

One of the feasts which has fallen out of favor in the United States in recent years is the Feast of St. Michael and All Angels, on September 29th. Angels have a strange appeal in our current age and make their ways into television and novels frequently.

The word "Angel" is derived from the Latin angelus meaning "messenger". The angels referred to in scripture are examples of the way in which God reveals something of God's self to (often unknowing) persons. Some of these messengers are assigned names (Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael) but more often, they are unnamed (such as the angel who came to Sarah in the Book of Genesis or to Mary in the Gospels). In invoking reference to angels, we bear witness to an experience common to every major religion of having a unique encounter with the Holy.

St. Michael is a particular angel referred to in the Revelation of St. John. John has a dream of a cosmic battle fought between heavenly messengers and forces of destruction (symbolized in a dragon) which threatens to annihilate those persons trying to seek justice. It is a vision which informs the writings of early English literature describing the great battle between St. George and the Dragon.

There have been many through history who have used this myth to instill fear in the hearts of persons who wonder if they are a participant in this battle. Who is fighting, and who will be the victor? John refers to the great cosmic battle between justice and power in which we are constantly engaged. We view this battle wondering "will the forces of truth and righteousness win? Is it even worth entering the battle?

The great joy and strength we receive in this bizarre vision of John is a glimpse of God's victory over evil. Archbishop Desmond Tutu had a glimpse of this victory in the midst of the struggle to end apartheid in South Africa. He was inspired to make the simple and powerful proclamation.

Goodness is stronger than evil.
Love is stronger than hate.
Light is stronger than darkness.
Life is stronger than death.
Victory is ours through Him who loved us.



Love Your Enemies: How Decent People Can Save America from the Culture of Contempt

by Arthur C. Brooks

Divisive politicians. Screaming heads on television. Angry campus activists. Twitter trolls. Today in America, there is an "outrage industrial complex" that prospers by setting American against American, creating a "culture of contempt"—the habit of seeing people who disagree with us not as merely incorrect, but as worthless and defective. Maybe, like more than nine out of ten Americans, you dislike it. But hey, either you play along, or you'll be left behind, right?

Wrong.

In Love Your Enemies, the New York Times bestselling author and social scientist Arthur C. Brooks shows that abuse and outrage are not the right formula for lasting success. Brooks blends cutting-edge behavioral research, ancient wisdom, and a decade of experience leading one of America's top policy think tanks in a work that offers a better way to lead based on bridging divides and mending relationships.

Brooks' prescriptions are unconventional. To bring America together, we shouldn't try to agree more. There is no need for mushy moderation, because disagreement is the secret to excellence. EPISCOPAL CHURCH OF ST. THOMAS

The mission of the church is to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.

To Welcome and Grow in Love.

BRIEF HISTORY—Thomas Coram, a wealthy sea captain and philanthropist, arrived from England in the 1690's and established a successful shipyard on the Taunton River. He returned to London in 1703 and left behind 59 acres of land in trust and a substantial collection of books to help found a Church of England in Taunton.

Twenty-five years later Thomas Coram's intent was carried out. In 1728 a congregation of lay persons gathered and a small church was built on the outskirts of town near the Three Mile River on what is now Tremont Street. Although the land trust was no longer available, Coram's library of books became the basis for the young parish's ministry. The church was named St. Thomas.

During the Revolution, St. Thomas Church, like most Episcopal Churches, fell upon hard times and was closed for a number of years as were many others in the area. The building itself stood unused and blew down in the Gale of 1815. In 1820 the parish was incorporated. In 1828 the Vestry voted to seek a minister who was called and then a new building was erected in the center of Taunton on High Street across from the present building.

The church grew rapidly leading to the enlargement of the building in the 1840's and this, too, was soon outgrown. The third and present structure designed by Richard Upjohn was consecrated in 1859. A chapel was added in 1869. A fire gutted the Church sanctuary in 1898, but it was rebuilt with the addition of a large three-manual Jardine organ in 1899.

The historically significant 1759 McKinstry House (present rectory) adjacent to the church was purchased in 1907 for use as a Sunday School. In 1910 Mr. & Mrs. Walter Cabot Baylies donated a Sunday School building. This parish house has proven to be of immeasurable value throughout the years to the church and to the entire community. In 1960 ground was broken for an addition to the parish house which completed the complex of buildings as we know it today.
